

Please Remember:

Proper etiquette and use of the trails is very important. Not only does it add to the enjoyment of all who use the trails, but it also protects the Caughlin Ranch community from the hazards of injury to both residents and visitors.

Tips for the Trails...

Wear comfortable shoes - it is easy to walk farther than you may have planned.

Carry a camera and binoculars - there are many pretty scenes to enjoy as well as hundreds of birds and animals who make their home in Caughlin Ranch.

Bring water - dehydration can occur quickly. Be safe - carry water if you plan to walk very far, or on a hot day.

Stay on the walkways - off-trail hiking and cutting across grass areas destroys the beauty Caughlin Ranch wishes to preserve.

Use the trashcans - trash and litter is unsightly and damaging to the environment.

Dogs MUST be on a leash and pet waste must be cleaned up - City Ordinance 2313 and 2706 requires that dogs be leashed and owners carry necessities to clean up after their dogs.

Announce your presence on wheels - There are many blind spots on the trails where pedestrians may not see or hear you coming - let them know you are there!

Ride slowly - if you are riding on the trails be reasonable and ride slow to protect residents, yourself, and wildlife.

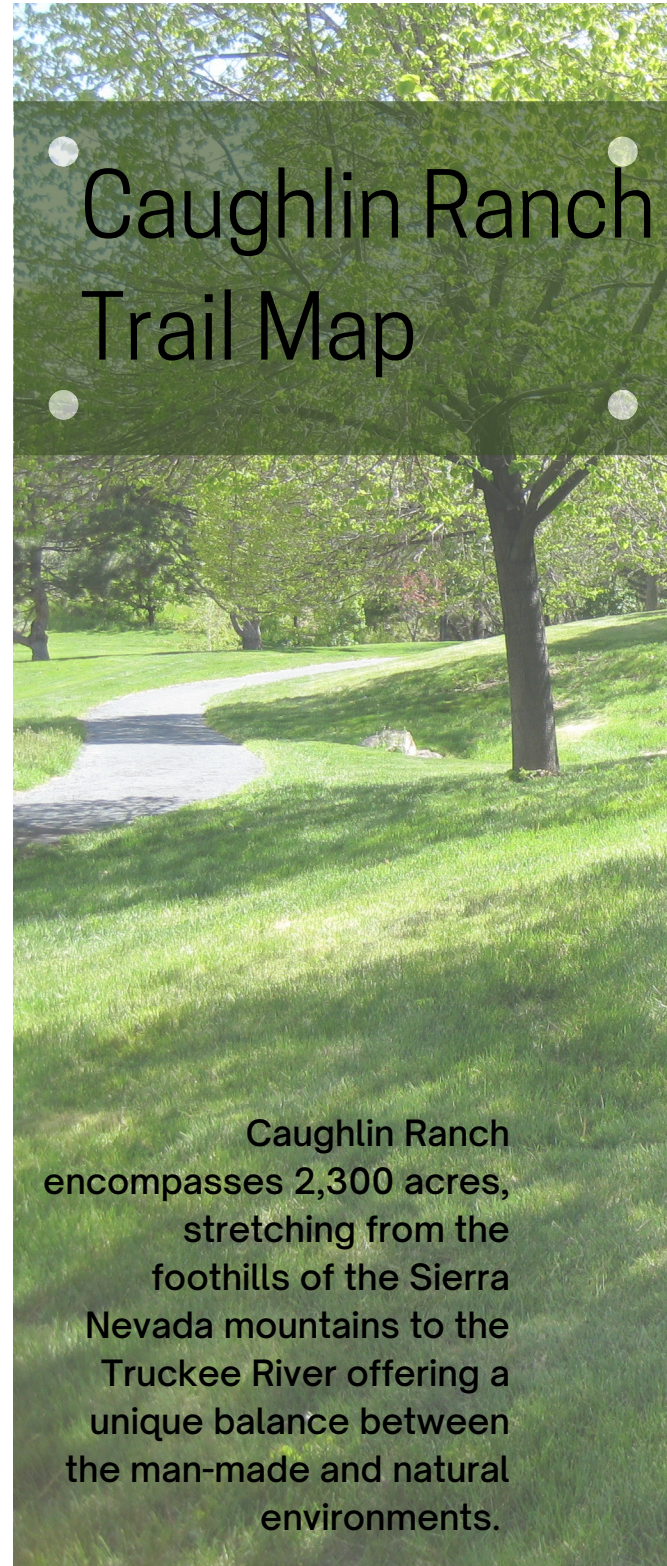
Be prepared for wildlife - While reasonably suburban in its nature, coyotes, deer, bobcats, smaller wildlife, and even the occasional bear can be encountered on the trails.

DO NOT FEED WILDLIFE

Feeding waterfowl in Caughlin Ranch is prohibited by the City of Reno. Feeding wildlife can put both the animals and people at risk.
